- 3. How does Aeschylus deal with the theme of the gods as divine powers and the workings of their will in his tragedies? Discuss with reference to any of his works you are familiar with.
- 4. Why does Livy preface his work by stating that history is a record of the infinite variety of human experience full of examples and warnings?
- 5. Fifth-Century Greek drama is dominated by the works of Sophocles and Euripides. What sort of themes appear in their tragedies? Discuss.

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SECTION B: DAILY LIFE IN ANCIENT ROME

- 1. Discuss the different kinds of games and spectacles which took place for the entertainment of Romans.
- 2. How was Roman society organised in terms of social classes and how did slaves fit into this context?
- 3. "Education for the Romans consisted of a mixture of martial arts and practical arts." Do you agree with this statement? Discuss.

- 1. Narrate the myth surrounding two of the following:
 - (a) Zeus and Hera
 - (b) Zeus and Themis
 - (c) Zeus and Nemesis
- 2. The myth of the Trojan saga occupies a very prominent position in Greek mythology. Discuss it and its significance.
- 3. What inspiration and insights can be obtained from the study of Greek mythology once it is understood that gods and goddesses represent, amongst other things, human and divine powers?
