The examiner reads out the following:

Text A

You are going to listen to a podcast called Famous British Bands.

Samantha Walsh: This is Samantha Walsh, welcoming you to the concluding episode in the series, Famous British Bands. Joining me today is Jim Hunter, an expert on the famous rock band, Led Zeppelin.

Jim Hunter: Hello, Samantha.

Samantha Walsh: Well Jim, what can you tell us about this famous band?

Jim Hunter: To begin with Samantha, the band Led Zeppelin was formed in London in 1968 but originally the group was called the New Yardbirds. The group comprised Robert Plant, Jimmy Page, John Paul Jones, and John Bonham. Initially unpopular, they achieved significant success over ten years with songs like the celebrated *Ramble On*.

Samantha Walsh: How did Led Zeppelin achieve this success?

Jim Hunter: The group was influenced by early rock and roll, Indian, and Arabic music. Jimmy Page and John Paul Jones composed most of the band's music, while Robert Plant contributed the lyrics.

Their 1969 debut album called, *Led Zeppelin*, was a top-ten album in several countries. In 1969, *Led Zeppelin II* was their first number-one album, followed in 1970 by *Led Zeppelin III*. Their 1971 untitled fourth album is one of the best-selling albums in history with 37 million copies sold.

Led Zeppelin's best-known song *Stairway to Heaven* forms part of this album. The band enjoyed extraordinary commercial success throughout the 1970s.

Samantha Walsh: Were Led Zeppelin influential in any way?

Jim Hunter: While Led Zeppelin never received the mainstream admiration accorded to the bands The Beatles or The Rolling Stones, their influence on rock music has been phenomenal. They are regularly referred to as the forerunners of both hard rock and heavy metal. Their sound has been imitated by many bands. They inspired hard rock bands to include acoustic elements in their music and were the first to experiment with Indian and North African music.

Jimmy Page's style has served as an important model for most rock guitarists, and John Bonham is often cited as the model drummer.

Samantha Walsh: Did Led Zeppelin eventually disband?

Jim Hunter: Yes, Led Zeppelin disbanded in 1980 after John Bonham's accidental death. The group re-formed for short, one-off performances in 1985 for the Live Aid concert, in 1995 for the band's induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, and in 2007 for the group's full-blown concert at which John Bonham's son, Jason, played the drums.

Samantha Walsh: Thank you, Jim. Those were some really, interesting facts about Led Zeppelin. We hope you've enjoyed the podcast. Thanks for listening.

The examiner reads out the following:

Text B

You are going to listen to the safety briefing at a trampoline park.

Welcome to Jumping Jacks, the only indoor trampoline park on the islands just for teenagers and which can be enjoyed all year round! I know you're all excited to bounce and try out our brand-new bouncy climbing wall and obstacle courses while trampolining. Trampolining is great fun and it's even more fun when you attend birthday celebrations and disco nights held here. However, it can also be dangerous, so please listen carefully to this safety briefing.

Once you've put all your coats and other belongings in the lockers, especially sharp objects like jewellery and keys, sanitise your hands. Put on your entry wristband and then, the approved grippy jumping socks, and make your way around the arena to the entrance which is located opposite the café. It is important to wait until your session begins. While you're waiting, we suggest you stretch and warm up. An announcement will be made by the safety marshal who will blow a whistle.

When jumping, always aim for the middle of the trampoline and land in the middle on two feet with your knees bent. Stay within the lines. That's the safe jumping area. Landing on the side padding can cause injury because it's not bouncy. Only one jumper at a time is allowed on a trampoline.

Triple front flips or backflips are prohibited. Enter feet first and never dive headfirst. The stunt area is for advanced jumpers only, so you must be able to demonstrate a controlled backflip to a safety marshal before you are allowed within this area. Only perform tricks within your ability. Don't run down the track as you may injure yourself or others.

And finally, when your half-hour session is up or you get tired, don't sit or lie down on the trampoline. Exit the bouncing zone and head round to our newly refurbished cafeteria on the top floor where you'll find plenty of seating to relax. If you're feeling peckish or want to quench your thirst, we have a varied menu available. However, all food and beverages must be consumed inside the cafeteria. The trampoline park is completely a non-smoking zone. Photos can only be taken outside the play area. We thank you for your attention and hope you have a great time at Jumping Jacks!

I ended up eating these unexpected treats for breakfast.

20 By wandering around a grocery store in another country, I can imagine what the lives of its citizens are like. In Italy seeing one aisle filled entirely with different types of pasta, I smiled to myself as it confirmed that it's not just a stereotype: Italians really do love their pasta. Walking through a supermarket in Germany was a delight, seeing the types of things that Germans might impulse buy. I could also watch children begging their parents for sweets, a universal experience that needs no language.

25 People might find it a weird habit to go grocery shopping on holiday. Surely, I'd rather spend my time doing something more fun like visiting museums. And don't get me wrong, I love doing this too. Being immersed in the day-to-day lives of a country's citizens helps you understand more about them. For all they know, I am not a tourist but a local. This, of course, tends to break down when I pay for my items. But for that half an hour, I put myself in the shoes of a local.

Just 20 kilometres south of Pisa in Italy, Livorno checks all the boxes of the typical European port city. It's chaotic and lively, multicultural, and strongly linked to the sea, both culturally and gastronomically. Plus, it is in the middle of Tuscany, which should automatically make **it** popular.

5 Yet, with only 10% of Florence's tourist numbers, Livorno is mostly ignored by visitors and the few who do show up often look like they arrived by accident. Stop one on the street, if you can find **one**, and ask why they are here. They will likely say they are waiting to board the ferry to Corsica or Sardinia.

10 But why is that? Firstly, Livorno is surrounded by renowned Tuscan towns that, many locals say, steal the spotlight. Others believe that throughout the years, the city's oil refineries, its port area and the US military base have given Livorno an industrial, polluted image. But travellers who speed through don't realise that they're missing out on a culturally lively town with a breathtaking coastline and a uniquely liberal attitude.

15 "By the 1800s, Livorno had become a popular summer destination for the Italian high society," says local historian Giorgio Mandalis. He explains that in the 1800s and up until World War Two, the city was home to some of Italy's first seaside resorts, **which** were regularly frequented by Italian royals, and had tourism facilities including hotels and spas. There was even a funfair with rollercoasters and an early version of a cinema.

20 However, the glory days didn't last forever. In World War Two, US air raids destroyed much of the strategic port and the city centre, making Livorno one of the most heavily bombed cities in Italy. Things got even worse with the reckless and hasty post-war redevelopment of entire neighbourhoods. Livorno's public image was further slain by simple modern structures which,

erected right next to 17th-Century classic-style buildings spared by the bombs, caused the area to look disharmonious and unbalanced.

25 On the other hand, Livorno does have its share of positives. "**We** have things that the other 'properly beautiful' Tuscan cities don't have," says Mandalis. "The city's cosmopolitan character, its openness, and brightness have always attracted painters, and Livorno is also filled with history and art, such as the ancient seaside resorts, the 14th-century lighthouse and the villas in front of the Naval Academy."

30 Things seem to be changing from a cultural point of view. "In the last years, the artistic scene has become livelier, especially with music festivals, theatres, art galleries and exhibitions, especially in summer," says Alessandra Falca, a Livorno-born musician who is very involved in the city's cultural scene.

35 In other words, the Tuscan city is made for visitors who are willing to dig a little deeper into the local history and take in **its** easy-going attitude. According to Falca, "The Livornese think there is no better city in the world. But judging by the number of tourists who come to Livorno, **they** are just saying it to themselves."
